NARR/Reference (a) identifies previous "off-limits" locations in the San Diego area. Reference (b) defines leave and liberty policy for the Mexico border area. Reference (c) establishes Commander, Navy Region Southwest (CNRSW) procedures for the operation of the Armed Forces Disciplinary Control Board. References (d) through (g) identify off-limits locations established by other AFDCBs within the CNRSW AOR.//

GENTEXT/REMARKS/ **1.** Pursuant to reference (c), the recommendations of the Armed Forces Disciplinary Control Board, and CNRSW's authority to declare a business "off-limits," the following "off-limits" orders are imposed upon all military personnel in the CNRSW area of regional coordination. This message cancels and supersedes reference (a) and incorporates references (d) through (g). This information should be disseminated through all available means, including the POD or POW, activity newspapers, command quarters, etc.

2. The following are off-limits to military personnel at all times:

- A. Go Navy Tax Service, corner of Harbor Drive and 32nd street, San Diego, CA and North Star Agency Tax Service, 401 N Coast Hwy #101, Oceanside, CA 92054.
- B. Deja Vu Showgirls San Diego Strip Club, 2720 Midway Drive, San Diego, CA.
- C. 3 Kings Hookah Lounge, 7059 El Cajon Boulevard, San Diego, CA.
- D. Main Street Motel, 3494 Main Street, San Diego, CA.
- E. Sams Smoke Shop, 16520 West Main Street, Barstow, CA.
- F. Adobe Smoke Shop, 6441 Adobe Road, Twentynine Palms, CA.
- G. STC Smoke Shop, 6001 Adobe Road, Twentynine Palms, CA.
- H. The Auto Shoppe, 5972 Adobe Road, Twentynine Palms, CA.
- I. Yucca Tobacco Mart, 57602 Twentynine Palms Highway, Yucca Valley, CA.
- J. Puffs Tobacco, 57063 Twentynine Palms Highway, Yucca Valley, CA.
- K. NYPD Pizza, 260-262 North Palm Canyon Drive, Palm Springs, CA.
- L. 8th Street Smoke Shop, 1225 West 8th Street, Yuma, AZ.
- M. Delys Smoke Shop, 2750 West 16th Street, Yuma, AZ.
- N. CMS Smoke Shop, 2241 South Avenue A Number 30, Yuma, AZ.
- O. Fourth Avenue Smoke Shop, 2099 South 4th Avenue, Yuma, AZ.
- P. Maverick Inn, 1460 South 4th Avenue, Yuma, AZ.
- Q. Jamestown Center, 4340 East 32nd Street, Yuma, AZ.
- R. Area known as Shit Creek, a one-mile radius surrounding the confluence of the Gila and Colorado Rivers, 1550 feet north of the bend on East Levee Road, east of South Avenue 4E, and west of South Avenue 4 1/2, Yuma, AZ.

3. While several States have legalized marijuana, the use, possession or distribution of marijuana and its cannabinoids remain prohibited under federal law and thus constitutes a violation of the Uniform Code of Military Justice. Military

personnel are therefore prohibited from entering any business, medicinal, recreational, or otherwise, that sells or distributes marijuana or Tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) in any form. This prohibition applies to fixed locations, as well as mobile dispensaries. Military personnel are also prohibited from attending, volunteering at, working, or otherwise participating in marijuana festivals and conferences, or any widely attended commercial event that sells, promotes, celebrates, encourages, or seeks to further the use of marijuana and THC-based products. Prohibited events include, but are not limited to: Emerald Cup, the Cannabinoids Cup, Humboldt Green Week, Cannagrow, Hemp Fest, and Cannifest.

4. Synthetic Stimulants and Opioids

- A. Pursuant to CA H&S code 11357.5 and 11375.5, as of 1 January 2012, it is illegal to sell synthetic cannabinoids and/or synthetic stimulants (i.e., bath salts, spice, etc.). Service members are reminded that even if sold in local establishments, the wrongful use, possession, manufacture, or distribution of controlled substance analogues, natural substances, chemicals, propellants and/or prescribed or over-the-counter drugs or pharmaceutical compounds with the intent to induce intoxication, excitement, or stupefaction of the central nervous system, such as those found in spice and bath salts, are a violation of Article 112(a)(1), Uniform Code of Military Justice and may result in administrative or disciplinary action.
- B. Fentanyl and carfentanil represent a significant health hazard to military members, particularly if encountered unwittingly while conducting routine command functions, such as field day and health and comfort inspections. Fentanyl and carfentanil are highly potent synthetic opioids. Fentanyl is listed as a schedule II prescription drug that mimics the effects of morphine in the human body, but has potency 50-100 times that of morphine, while carfentanil is 10,000 times more potent than morphine. Ingestion can occur orally, inhaled through the nose or mouth, or absorbed through the skin or eyes. Fentanyl can be lethal at very low exposure levels with doses as small as 2 micrograms. Fentanyl and carfentanil may come in several forms, including powder, blotter paper, tablets, patch, liquid, and spray. Signs and symptoms of fentanyl exposure or overdose usually occur within minutes and may include cardiac arrest, respiratory depression or arrest, drowsiness, disorientation, sedation, or unresponsiveness, pinpoint pupils, clammy skin, bluish or purplish lips or fingernails, and vomiting or gurgling. Due to recent seizures, trends, and uses of fentanyl and carfentanil with other illegal substances, the potential exists for service members to come into contact with these dangerous substances. In order to protect service members, the following precautions should be applied:
 1. Use of nitrile gloves with a minimum thickness of 5 millimeters should be worn during all types of inspections where there is a potential for command members to come into contact with these substances; latex gloves have been determined to be ineffective at preventing exposure to fentanyl.
 2. If service members discover an unknown white powdery substance or other unidentified substance, do not touch or attempt to identify it. Secure the location and notify security personnel.
 3. If a service member believes they have been exposed to or display any of the above mentioned symptoms, call 911 immediately. Naloxone (narcan) can counteract a fentanyl overdose.

5. The following areas are not off-limits, but are potentially dangerous. Caution should be exercised when in the vicinity:

- A. Loitering in Willie Henderson Park/San Diego City Park, at 45th Street and Logan Avenue, San Diego, CA.
- B. Loitering in the 2600 to 3600 block of Main Street, including the McDonald's and Burger King parking lots on 28th Street, San Diego, CA from 0001 to 0400.
- C. Loitering in Denny's parking lot (south side of E Street between Woodlawn Avenue and Broadway), 692 E Street, Chula Vista, from 0001 to 0400 Wednesday to Sunday.
- D. Naval Base San Diego perimeter area. Some areas surrounding the external perimeter area of Naval Base San Diego is potentially dangerous. Particular precaution should be exercised during hours of darkness on Main Street from 32nd Street to Interstate-5 in National City.
- E. Trolley stations in San Diego, CA. Many trolley stations become potentially dangerous areas after trolley services secure, especially the Palomar Street and San Ysidro stations. Personnel using trolley services should know the hours of operation. Personnel utilizing trolley services may be at a higher risk for crimes of violence and may also be targeted by criminal elements recruiting individuals to engage in dangerous, cross-border activities.
- F. Tijuana. Reference (b) governs travel to, liberty in, and residency in Mexico for all naval personnel. Failure to comply with the requirements of reference (b) may result in administrative or disciplinary action.

6. If you believe a certain establishment or location should be placed on the off-limits list, contact your command senior enlisted advisor.

7. Paragraphs 2 and 3 of this message constitute a lawful general order. Violations are punishable under Article 92 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice. This message remains effective until canceled or superseded.
